Our 1<sup>st</sup> year down not what we quite expected but we diffentley exceeded our targets and goals When we set out in Jan 18 with seeting up a Disability Group in Solai little did we know it would grow to over 70 members, from here we by default ended up doing education support (plan was to phase this in over time) such was the need of the community in Solai (we currently look after approx 15 children re there education ) this exculdes disabled children we support in a Local school Along with Mary's involvement with Home Care International who run a rescue centre for boys and girls in Nakuru

Out side of these programs the Clinic itself has seen a very eventful year, been overall a positive year. It was tested to the full on that Faithful night of May 9<sup>th</sup> the night the dam burst its banks and our wee clinic became the only bekon of hope. This disaster took approx 50 lives and still to this day has rocked the community of Sola



Looking at the needs of the Community we highlighted the Following short comings and hope to deal with in 2019

#### 1. Maternity / In-Patient Unit

About 21 pregnant women die every day in Kenya due to complications from childbirth. That's equivalent to two 10 seated commuter micro minibuses known as matatus crashing everyday with the loss of all the passengers on board. Pregnant women in Kenya die because they either do not receive appropriate care during pregnancy or are unable to deliver with the help of skilled health attendants.

WHO recommends four antenatal visits and skilled care during and immediately after delivery? It also recommends obstetric care in cases of complications as key to reducing maternal and neonatal deaths. Kenya has introduced a maternity fee waiver making this service accessible to all. Despite the increase of women (rich and middle class) giving birth in



hospitals poor women from the urban and rural areas still shun giving birth at a health facility due to a lack of trust in public health system and cost of getting to same

In rural Solai many women are opting to give birth at home with the help of a traditional birth attendant which most times is risky as there is no skilled personnel supervising the birth process and the rate of mortality is high,

This is where we aim to help via our Maternity Unit Provide all the necessary Quality care to all in Solai and Surrounding Communities

#### Maternity Unit

- Delivery Room
- Consultation Room x1
- 4 bed ward
- Antenatal room
- Post Natal room
- Family Planning room
- Ultra Sound room

The establishment of an In-Patient Unit will enable us expand our Clinic Services to the community where we can offer over Night /Day in –patient care where necessary / Currently we look after these patients in a spare Room in our Clinic if the medical need arises which is not really appropriate but one has to work with what Facilities we have for now

#### In-Patient

- Consultation Room x1
- Waiting Room Reception (used for Maternity Unit as well)
- 3 ×2 bed wards (Male /Female/Children)

There will also be a Kitchen and Laundry room plus Bathroon /Shower unit that will cater for Maternity and Inpatient Units

2. Community Centre

The Community center will be on a separate site from Clinic as per legislation (can't have it next to a Maternity /In-Patient unit)

- Training room (beadwork/ social skills/ sewing etc.)
- Computer room
- Library / study room for Children
- Disability Day Care Centre
- Main hall

As you can see the task that is ahead of us is a big one but will be broken down into separate projects

Our main aim is to maintain and grow our existing projects for 2019 as we roll out our additional services over a phased basis based on funds available
